1. Theme:

What lesson or main idea about life did Dillard learn from the experience of the chase and how do you know? Where is her point explicitly revealed? (S.U.R.E Answer)

2. Point of View:

a. What is Dillard's <u>point of view</u> in this narrative and how do you know? Is her perspective that of a seven-year-old girl, or that of an adult writer reflecting on her childhood experience? How do you know?

b. How does her point of view choice impact the overall effect of the essay? (S.U.R.E. Answer)

3. Language:

Dillard makes extensive use of careful <u>syntax and descriptive language</u>. Syntax is how a writer puts together words and phrases to form sentences. Syntax can be deliberate and careful, like in this narrative.
